## CHILDREN'S & FAMILIES' ACTIVITIES COORDINATOR

We are looking for someone with a real understanding of the needs of children in families struggling with poverty. We are in close touch with almost 100 children from babies to teenagers, among whom there are a significant number with disabilities.

This Project has a strong team of 4 with responsibilities for outings, birthday and Christmas gifts, activity camp placements and transport. We hope to add someone to cover school uniform provision. This summer we are sending 2 families to Butlins, 25 youngsters to Falcon Camps and arranging a day trip to Littlehampton. Last year we went to Hounslow Urban Farm. The new Coordinator will be able to build on our present links with the Polka Theatre.

Timing is very flexible as most of the work is done at home. It needs time for creative thinking, planning, phoning and emailing. It can involve an average of 2 days a month at the Office which is a relaxing place for group or one-to-one meetings and all the toys are stored there; this would occupy **either** a morning **or** an afternoon. There could be 1 or 2 full days a year for family events.

The Coordinator will work closely in a team with the other 5 Project Coordinators under the leadership of the CARE Coordinator and can have administrative support from the Office team.

Everyone in Christian CARE is a volunteer.
